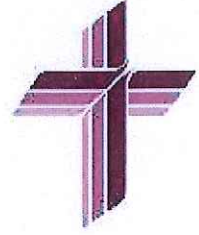

FROM THE PASTOR’S DESK

I’m sure you have heard that on October 4 I announced to the congregation my intention to retire at the end of the year. In the statement I read to the congregation I stated:

I see a congregation that is ready to continue to deliver the Gospel to Preston, Maryland and the surrounding area. With members of the congregation taking the lead, we have participated in the annual Preston parade, improved the parking for the handicapped, begun an additional Saturday Contemporary Service, and other projects. This has happened while many people have kept this congregation functioning with regular services, a fine music program, and a preschool which continues to have a good reputation in this community.

With winter quickly approaching, the LMS is looking for donations of gently used coats – especially children’s coats – and blankets. These can be left in the hallway of Geiger Hall.

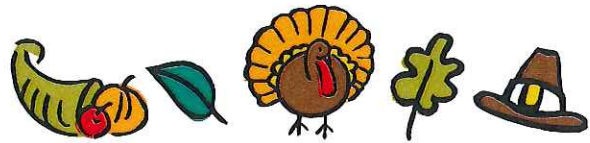
The food pantry is low on several items. The items most needed are canned soups, fruits, pastas and instant oatmeal. Food donations can be left in the designated baskets in the narthex.

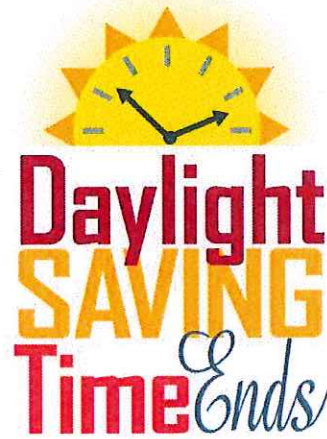

If you forget the time change and show up an hour early for Worship service, don’t go back home, drop in to Sunday school instead; they’ll be glad to see you.

A THOUGHT ON WORSHIP

(From the Epistle to the church at Rome)

“The just shall live by faith.”

“Being justified by faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ.”

“Nothing can separate us from the love of God, which is in Christ Jesus our Lord.”

These texts sum up the essence of the Reformation (October 31, 1517). St. Paul clearly states that only faith, a gift of the Holy Spirit, can apprehend the saving goodness of the Father through the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. We today must hold fast to that scriptural truth and pass it on. Our friend Martin Luther had restated that truth many years ago and we profess it today for the sake of all.

Reformation Day (October 31) may have been celebrated a day or so ago, but it is important that we consider the ongoing results of Luther's requests for discussing the heart of the church, “Jesus Christ.” Let us take a moment and review again the Reformation's real meaning.

“In most big libraries, books by and about Martin Luther occupy more shelf room than those concerned with other human beings, except Jesus of Nazareth.”** Luther is still a monumental figure in theology, church practice, church song and teaching. (There is also the impact of Luther on education, laity importance and the formation of the present German language through his translation of the Scriptures.) We still read Luther, quote Luther, use his catechisms and sing his hymns. His impact upon the church and her duties stand vital and strong.

But Dr. Luther is not the object of adoration. What he did was to play his role in God's plan for the church. So we must also play our role as missionaries to the world, a world desperately needing a faith connection with its Creator, Redeemer and Sanctifier.

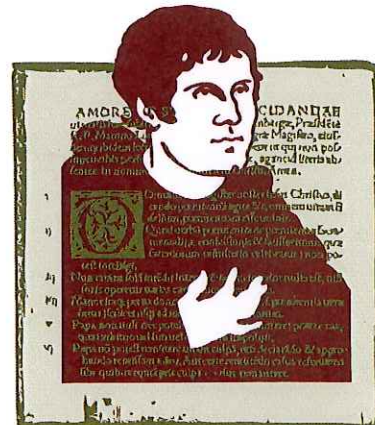
Reformation was not meant to be simply an event but rather a process through which the church re-examines itself and keeps the focus on God clear. The church is always reforming and re-focusing.

The dynamics of a Reformation celebration are not vitriolic or bombastic, not combative or aggressive to other religious concepts or even the Holy See. Rather, it is a quiet affirmation that God in Christ still rules His church through the truth of the Word – Jesus Christ.

While some boast of being Lutheran as compared to Roman Catholics, best we revel in being part of the Church Catholic, God's universal church. We are among those in search of Christ, the son of the Living God.

Wow, what a great school year we're having here at Immanuel Lutheran Nursery School! Our students have been busy little bees ☺

During the month of October the 3-year-old class has been learning to recognize the letters C, D, E, F and G, and colors - purple and orange, along with the rectangle shape; while the 4-year-old class has been learning to recognize the five vowels and the short vowel sounds, as well as learning to recognize, write, and sound out the letters O, A, T, and L and numbers 3, 4, 5, and 6. MERCY MINISTRIES — NOVEMBER 1-30 This month, The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod (LCMS) celebrates the mercy work that is being carried out by LCMS members at home and abroad. Thanks to the abundant grace we have received through Jesus Christ's sacrificial death and resurrection, we have been freed to love, serve and speak up for our neighbors who are hurting and in need. Please join the Synod in praying for the work of Life Ministry, Health Ministry, Deaconess Ministry, Disaster Response, Gospel Seeds, Specialized Pastoral Ministry and Ministry to the Armed Forces.

Remember God's work through the Synod's mercy ministries as you pray:

1. for the unborn, the elderly and all those whom our sinful world considers "burdens." Ask God to protect vulnerable people and give everyone an appreciation for life at all of its stages.
2. for upcoming Mercy Medical Teams that will travel to Madagascar, Tanzania and Kenya. Pray for the safety of team members, and ask that their efforts would be a blessing to the people they serve.
3. that God would soften hearts that are hard to the suffering of others. Ask Him to give all people compassion and a willingness to help and serve their neighbor.
4. that the Jan. 22 March for Life in Washington, D.C., and the Jan. 23 Walk for Life West Coast in San Francisco would be an encouragement to those who attend and a positive witness to those they encounter.
5. for Stephanie Neugebauer, the new director of LCMS Life and Health Ministries. Ask God to guide her words and actions as she serves the Synod in this role.
6. with thanksgiving for the Synod's 1,000-plus parish nurses, who use their many skills to care for the health and well-being of LCMS members.
7. that God would call even more Lutheran registered nurses to serve their churches and communities as parish nurses.
8. with thanksgiving for the dedicated volunteers who join the Synod's Mercy Medical Teams. A group from Iowa District West recently provided much-needed medical care to 2,231 Pokot people in western Kenya in just one week!
9. for God to provide even more skilled volunteers for Mercy Medical Teams. Doctors, nurses, pharmacists and other types of medical professionals, as well as pastors and hard-working laity, are needed.
10. with thanksgiving for women around the world who heed the call to serve God's Church as deaconesses. Pray that His kingdom would be served through their acts of mercy with the compassion and love of Jesus.
11. for safe travels for Deaconess Grace Rao, director of LCMS Deaconess Ministry, as she visits deaconess students around the world to provide training and encouragement.
12. with thanksgiving for Deaconess Carol Halter, who has served the Chinese people in Hong Kong since 1981. Please ask God to bless her efforts, especially her ministry to Hong Kong's "street sleepers" — the homeless and formerly homeless who now live in government housing.
13. that deaconesses would not grow weary or become indifferent to the suffering around them. Instead, ask that God would refresh them each day to love and serve others.
14. with thanksgiving for the seven new deaconesses who graduated in April from a special two-year training program of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Tanzania. Concordia Theological Seminary, Fort Wayne, Ind., assisted with the training by sending professors to provide intensive courses to the students.

17. for the Synod's international disaster-response ministry. Thank the Lord that He uses all things for good. Through disaster response, the LCMS and her partners have been able to share the Gospel with people around the world.

18. with thanksgiving for the thousands of volunteers who have been trained to serve on Lutheran Early Response Teams (LERT). LCMS Disaster Response trains these LCMS members to respond to their communities with tangible acts of love and mercy following a disaster.

19. that the Lord would raise up even more volunteers who are willing to serve their communities through LERT.

20. for the victims of recent tornadoes in the Midwest. Pray that through LCMS districts, congregations and members, communities would be restored and transformed through acts of mercy and a bold witness to the Gospel.

21. with thanksgiving for the rededication of St. John's Lutheran Church, New Minden, Ill., in August. Recovery work is finally complete after a tornado caused extensive damage to the church in 2013.

22. that no matter what comes our way — whether hurricane, tornado, fire or other tragedy — the Lord would comfort us with His promise to never leave us or forsake us.

23. for the "Planting Gospel Seeds While Serving Human Needs" program, that it would help LCMS congregations build closer relationships with their neighbors and make new disciples for Christ!

24. that LCMS congregations would be wise, passionate and creative as they look for tangible ways to serve their communities — whether that's through a food pantry, an after-school program or another outreach program.

25. that LCMS members would take seriously God's call to love their neighbors in word and deed. Ask the Holy Spirit to stir up zeal in their hearts to serve His Church with their time, talents and treasures.

26. with thanksgiving for the 562 ordained or commissioned ministers of the Gospel who serve in LCMS Specialized Pastoral Ministry.

27. for LCMS pastoral counselors, clinical pastoral educators and chaplains who provide care in hospitals, prisons, police and fire agencies, and other institutions. Ask the Lord to give them strength as they serve people in the midst of some of life's most difficult moments.

28. that military chaplains would continue to have the freedom to boldly share the Word of God with servicemen and women.

29. for the safety and well-being of the Synod's military chaplains, who eat, sleep, train, work and exercise with their flock, both in combat and in garrison, bringing the Gospel of Jesus Christ to distressed service members.

30. for those who care for the spiritual and emotional needs of LCMS missionaries. These people, based both on the international mission field and in the U.S., help missionaries deal with the ups and downs of life abroad.
